#### DATES TO REMEMBER



October 7: Reception for Abraham Lincoln, Candidate for President of the United States, early evening, watch for a time update, at the Opera House. Meet Candidate Lincoln on this day in 1860. He is running for President of the United States and will be available for meeting, greeting, kissing babies and shaking hands. Our photographers will also be on hand, but with better technology than is available in the rest of the country in 1860. The presentation will be courtesy of Danny Russell of Famous Hoosiers.

October 8: We continue our celebration of Pulaski County's TorchFest and Indiana's Bicentennial. The Opera House will have food and craft vendor booths open from 8:00 AM until 2:00 PM. Around town will be several food items, bands, beer tents, games for children and adults, and entertainment opportunities.

November 5: Band Over, 6:30 – 9:00, Opera House. You know them. They sound just as good today as they did ten years ago. We'll invite everyone to bring carry-in foods, and we'll have a 50/50 drawing.

December 3: A Downtown Christmas, 8:00 - 2:00, Opera House. We'll have vendors galore, including food and a variety of craft and hobby items.



### A DOWNTOWN CHRISTMAS, DECEMBER 3

Northern Indiana Power From The Past's 2016 Antique Power Show will present a special Indiana Bicentennial Legacy exhibit showcasing 200 years of Hoosier farming.

Area residents are invited to contribute and assist with the exhibit which will transport visitors from 1816, the dawn of Indiana's statehood, and move them through 200 years of agricultural history.



The interactive display will be roughly divided into four segments representing 50 years each, and will demonstrate farm life, significant agriculture events, and technological advances surrounding Pulaski County and Indiana's agricultural heritage. The exhibit will be located in the 4-H Building on the showgrounds.

Organizers will accept items on loan to help illustrate the display. Exhibit items may include tools, machinery, equipment, signs, packaging, and other materials that will help illustrate 200 years of Indiana (and particularly Pulaski County) agriculture. Volunteers are also welcome to help man shifts for the display, including members of youth groups, clubs, churches, or individuals.
